Greetings and welcome to the opening play of the Sankofa African American Theatre Company's 2023 – 2024. I am delighted to share with you our vision and mission for this season.

Sankofa is a word from the Akan language of Ghana that means "go back and get it". It is often symbolized by a bird that flies forward while looking backward, carrying an egg in its mouth. The egg represents the future, and the bird reminds us to learn from the past to build a better future. This is the essence of Sankofa: to honor our history, celebrate our culture, and inspire our community. Theatre is a collaborative art form, and we are proud to partner with other local theatre companies to bring you stories that challenge, inspire, and entertain.

This season's plays reflect this essence in different ways. Our first play, "Between Hevan and Eartha a not-so-tall tale about climate change" was born out of a beautiful collaboration of playwrights, partnerships and artists who put the success of the project over personal pride and gain. This timely and relevant story explores the impact of climate change on our lives and our relationships. It is a play that challenges us to listen to each other, to understand each other, and to work together for a common cause.

In December Sankofa will present "Black Nativity by Langston Hughes", the iconic gospel song play that retells the Christmas with an African American perspective. It is a play that celebrates the joy and hope of the Christmas season, as well as the rich and diverse traditions of the African diaspora. It is a play that reminds us of the power of faith, music, and community.

In February, Sankofa will collaborate with Gamut Theatre to produce "The Jackson Rooming House", "The Jackson Rooming House", is an original and new work set against the backdrop of a welcoming rooming house or Black travelers and entertainers coming through Harrisburg during the first half of the twentieth century. This play honors our local history, as well as the contributions of African Americans to the music, culture and hospitality industry of our nation and invites us to explore the stories behind the names and faces that shaped our society.

In June we will partner with Theatre Harrisburg to stage "Intimate Apparel" by Lynn Nottage in this moving drama that follows the life of Esther, a seamstress who makes lingerie for women of different backgrounds in New York City in 1905. It is a play that portrays the struggles and dreams of a woman who seeks love and fulfillment in a changing world. It is a play that challenges us to question the stereotypes and prejudices that divide us.

I wholeheartedly agree with the phenomenal playwright Lynn Nottage who said, "I think theater can be used as an instrument for social change because it's one of those rare places where people can gather together collectively and have their hearts opened." Sankofa African American Theatre Company is on a mission to open hearts, deepen understanding, foster healing, and create a truly inclusive community by bringing diverse voices and stories to the stage.

Rachel McDevitt reports on energy, the environment, and climate change for StateImpact Pennsylvania at WITF.

Rachel covers Pennsylvania state government's policy on climate change, its effects on people, and lawmakers' approach to the industries that generate many of Pennsylvania's greenhouse gas emissions. Her work through the collaborative Climate Solutions puts special focus on communities and individuals working to address the effects of climate disruption.

Her stories have aired nationally on the NPR shows Morning Edition, All Things Considered, Weekend Edition, and Science Friday.

Rachel joined WITF in 2014 as a Radio Pennsylvania reporter before becoming the local host of All Things Considered in 2017. Scott Blanchard is Director of Journalism at WITF. He joined the public media station in 2017, moving from print/digital to radio/digital. He oversees StateImpact Pennsylvania, a collaboration of public media stations covering the state's energy transition, and the collaboration Climate Solutions, which uses education, engagement and journalism to help central Pennsylvanians work toward solutions to climate challenges. Previously, he was enterprise editor at the York (Pa.) Daily Record, leading investigative and projects reporting. He and a YDR photographer worked with the Dart Center for Journalism and Trauma to create a trauma-awareness/peer-support program for the YDR and sister newsrooms. That effort grew from Blanchard's experience as a 2013 Ochberg Fellow at Dart, where he was trained in PTSD science, selfhelp and peer support. He is a board member of the Trust for Trauma Journalism. He is a Pennsylvania NewsMedia Association Foundation board member, and is a past president of the Pennsylvania Society of News Editors. A Rockville, Md., native, he is a graduate of the University of Missouri's journalism school.



Nadine Garner, Ed.D., LPC

Nadine Garner, Ed.D., LPC is an Associate Professor of Psychology at Millersville University of Pennsylvania and the Director of two Trauma Institutes: Trauma–Informed Training for K–12 Educators and Trauma–Informed Training for Mental Health Professionals. She is a counselor educator and supervisor in the School Counseling M.Ed. and Certification programs.

Dr. Garner is the program coordinator for the Supervisor of Guidance Services certificate. She is a Licensed Professional Counselor (LPC) and holds certifications as a Professional School Counselor (PSC) and KI2 Music Educator. Dr. Garner is the chair of the university's Sustainability Committee and founded and directed the Center for Sustainability.

Dr. Garner is a published author in professional journals and textbooks and is co-author of the book, A School with Solutions: Implementing a Solution-Focused/Adlerian-Based Comprehensive School Counseling Program. Dr. Garner is a Volunteer Land Steward at the Lancaster Conservancy and a Wilderness Advanced First Aid provider and assists with interpretive hikes through the Conservancy's preserves.



Dr. Claire A. Jantz

Dr. Claire A. Jantz is a Professor and Chair of the Geography-Earth Science Department and Director of the Center for Land Use and Sustainability (CLUS) at Shippensburg University (<a href="https://centerforlanduse.org/">https://centerforlanduse.org/</a>). While earning her PhD in geography from the University of Maryland, she worked as a full-time research associate at the Woodwell Climate Research Center in Woods Hole, MA. In 2005 she joined the faculty at SU, and in 2015 became the director of the CLUS.

Dr. Jantz has spent nearly 20 years engaged in the interdisciplinary field of land use science and is recognized as a leader in land use and ecosystem change modeling. Under her leadership, the CLUS has become a widely respected applied research center that provides science to support sustainable land use decisions at local and regional scales. Central to the work of the CLUS is engaging students – as the next generation of productive citizens – in meaningful work that highlights the interdisciplinary nature of contemporary sustainability challenges.

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
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
